Idealist/Realist Reflections on Psalm 8

Somewhere early in life's journey, perhaps, at about age 13-14, living with my grandmother, in the Saturday morning ritual of grandmother's hot oatmeal and bible readings before the meal, I read or heard Psalm 8. I do not know if it was then that I began to seriously reflect on the words; but, at some point in the years that followed, I began to engage with the mystery of life and its meaning. These were the words that brought me into deep thought:

ADONAI! Our Lord! How glorious is your name throughout the earth! The fame of your majesty spreads even above the heavens! When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and stars that you set in place —what are mere mortals, that you concern yourself with them, ...humans, that you watch over them with such care?

Psalm 8: 1, 3-4 (Complete Jewish Bible)

Looking at the heavens... the wonders of sun, moon, stars, the murky cluster of light illumining the pitch dark of night, galaxies and universes beyond distance and light, the confronting questions of causation and creation – the Big Bangs and Dark Holes, the likelihood of life in other planets and universes. The Earth bountiful in life forms – creatures unique, weird, beautiful, colorful, holding smell, texture, character. All in all – symmetry in fractals of fractals. Mysteries of space and time, waves of energy. The mystery of trees' root endings having "brain-clusters," that is, communication systems, connecting one tree to another. Universal consciousness. Interconnectedness. O, the beauty and variety of creation! – The striped snakes, fish, and butterflies, songbirds, hummingbirds, the singing whales. O, the beauty of it all! And, then, there is Man and Woman, homo sapiens.

What are mortals – humans, man and woman – that You are mindful of them?! That You care for them?!

Now, as in so many times in the past, I stop. I wonder. I turn to the sages, asking, What is "man"? What is the meaning of "man"? What is the purpose of humankind? Why are we here? Why am I here? What is my purpose, my calling? Sages answer from scripture. Sages of ancient civilizations – Greek, Roman, African, Asian, Indigenous Peoples each have a say. Enriched by them all. They are nameable, held in mind, appreciated.

Today in this writing, beyond the Bible and texts on Jesus, I reach out to the bookshelf, in hand... Rabindranath Tagore's Sadhana—the Realization of Life, Viktor Frankl's Man's Search for Meaning, Abraham Heschel's Who Is Man?, fall into hand, and now one, being re-read, Richard Leider's The Power of Purpose. I won't search deeper onto the shelves. No need, though I do. No need because I have Psalm 8 and Psalm 136.

Humans have forever been in search of meaning across all ages and societies. We have our Confucius, Socrates, Sidarta Gautama (Buddha), and writers of the Upanishads, I-Ching, and in our tradition, the Book of Wisdom, Psalms, and Proverbs, Sayings of Jesus in the four gospels, and so many others outside our familiar traditions all addressing the central question, "What are mortals that you concern yourself with them?" ... Who are we anyway? What is our purpose?

In a recent Sunday sermon, I referred to existential sadness. For some, those who dispositionally are inclined to ask about the questions that Psalm 8:4-5 raises – questions about existence, the meaning of existence, questions of meaninglessness in the face of evil, the suffering of the innocent, mortality, the finality of death, the hope of resurrection, and, indeed, of what their own lives are about – what they shall come to or need to come to..., for such people, "sadness" – existential sadness can be an issue, for some, "sadness" is a chronic issue leading to depression and the taking of their own lives (Why live?...).

We are not required to come into a deep reflection of what Psalm 8 means, ...even though sages do. Being a "sage" is a part of who we are as "homo sapiens" – however, we are not required to be "wise" or to seek "wisdom." But, blessed are we if we are, if we do, if we dare. But in wisdom, by our biting the apple (Genesis 3:1-7), "eyes opened," we come to see both the good and the evil in existence – terrifying, dismaying! How do we handle, manage that knowledge? Where does that knowledge leave us?

Having bitten the "forbidden fruit," having knowledge of good and evil, we must now be responsible (response-able) humans? ...We have a will. We can choose.

Do we dare choose! Do we willfully, fully consciously, choose how we shall respond to the challenges of existence? ... Discernably balancing the Sad with the Joys of life? Do we resign to fate, spit in its face, saying, "to hell with it"?" Do we distract ourselves with the busyness of life and with circus? Or do we look at life head-on, accepting what we see in the myriad contradictions, creating and embracing alternative choices among the good/better and the bad/worse, accepting the givenness of life in what it is and could be? ...Being active, agents, co-creators!

We can make a "project" of life. We can find a cause to invest in – through which to create meaning out of life. We can ask of life what it is asking of us, given our gifts and abilities.

O, Adonai, you have made us "response-able." May we response to the wonder of your creation by reflecting on the meaning of the Great Mystery of your creation and our place in it! Give us the courage and the strength to engage such a fearsome reflection. Give us hope and trust that, even in the face of unanswerable questions, you are at our side, assured that whatever there is "out there" and "beyond" you love us and all of creation, that whatever good there is or can be for us, in the eternity of eternities, you shall give that to us. Amen.

You made mortals but little lower than the angels, you crowned them with glory and honor, you had them rule what your hands made, you put everything under their feet —sheep and oxen, all of them, also the animals in the wilds, the birds in the air, the fish in the sea, whatever passes through the paths of the seas. ADONAI!

Our Lord! How glorious is your name throughout the earth!

- Pastor's schedule will be modified due to the timing of the workflow. Monday will now be the Pastor's "work from home" day. Friday will be the Pastor's day off.
- Consideration is being given to providing temporary housing to a family in need. Scott Freier is doing the vetting for this.
- The Easter Egg Hunt was attended by 24 children. The weather was lovely. The year is winding down, May 5 th is the last day of Sunday School for this school year. The annual Birthday Cake Drive is underway
